

Elmhurst Summer Newsletter June 2020

Dear Families,

I hope that you are all keeping well and enjoying the easing of some of the national restrictions, including seeing up to 6 friends and family indoors. As a school we are looking forward to the 21st June, when we can review our risk assessment and invite parents/carers into school for events, as long as the government's roadmap is on schedule. We have had a positive case this week amongst a member of support staff and this has resulted in a year 2 class having to self isolate. We have provisionally planned a cultural evening /summer fair and the year 6 children are busy rehearsing A Midsummer Night's Dream, which they are hoping to perform for parents/ carers in the new theatre in July.

As many of you are aware, the school has focussed on raising funds for India where Covid is currently overwhelming the country. The PTA are discussing further fundraising ideas this week, including for the Palestinian community and people of Gaza who have been devastated by the recent bombing. Ms Islam and Ms Rahman, our Global Rights lead, will be discussing how to incorporate an educational focus so that pupils understand more about the situation in Gaza. Thank you to families for attending the recent Sex Education consultation meetings, there will be a further one on 8th June from 6-7pm to accommodate requests from working parents for an evening meeting. I would like to thank Ms Islam who has led these meetings and I know that families have praised her sensitivity and listening skills. Please rest assured that the school will work with parents/carers and take into consideration concerns relating to content, approaches and resources.

I wanted to say a huge thank you to all of the parents who have regularly contributed to the mosaic project - the work that you are putting into this initiative is very much appreciated by the school and the final mural should be ready by the end of term for us all to enjoy in the KS1 playground. A special thanks to these parents: Humaira Patel, Hafsa Begum, Iram Jehan, Dipika Patel, Hawa Bhaiyat and Saleha Ahmed' for dedicating their time to help out in this project. We are having a big focus on adapting our curriculum so that it continues to be World class and also helps pupils to address gaps in their education caused by the national lockdowns. Mrs Silverwood will be sharing the changes and our vision as part of the next PTA meeting on the 25th June at 9.30am and will also be writing to parents. We will follow this with a series of curriculum workshops which will start later this term and go into the autumn term and I am hoping these will be on site.

I wish all of our school community a restful and happy half term break and wish to thank everyone for their hard work and commitment. Elmhurst continues to go from strength to strength and this quote from Debate Mate and Deloitte (a company supporting our year 5 & 6 pupils in speech making) expresses this beautifully:


Elmhurst Debaters...


Elmhurst debaters have had a busy fortnight, with pupils competing in 6 competitive debates - and winning every single one! The school had two teams competing in both the first round of the East London Debating League and the Debate Mate Cup, speaking on motions ranging from the best way to combat malaria to whether after-school sports clubs should be compulsory. The teams, made up of 20 children across years five and six, did brilliantly and the school is very proud. In particular, Tasnuba from 6S won the award for most improved speaker in the country. This is not the end of the exciting times for the debating clubs, with more competitions on the horizon and with Elmhurst having been chosen by Debate Mate to work with consulting company Deloitte on a special debating project over the next half term.

Year 1 Numbersense Work

In year 1 we have been focusing on becoming fluent with our number facts. We have looked at making one more and one less, the patterns made by odd and even numbers and number bonds of 10 and their fact families. We have been using a range of strategies including our ten frames, number lines and part whole models to develop a really secure understanding of numbers and make our year 1 children into confident mathematicians.

In addition to our number work, year 1 have been exploring 2D and 3D shapes. We even made our own impressive 3D shapes using cocktail sticks and marshmallows.











Learning about the Partition

Year Six pupils have been delving into one of the most important but controversial moments of the twentieth century with their new history unit, looking at the Partition of India in 1947.

The idea for the unit was first suggested by Ms Samra, due to how the families of many of our students have been impacted by this momentous event. The lessons cover the Mughal Empire, the rise and fall of the East India Company, the role of Gandhi in the independence movement, the impact of Partition and then the enduring aftermath of the events. So far, the first three lessons have been taught and have been very successful. Daiwik from 6T said: 'Most of the people in the school are from that part of the world, so it is great to learn about our family stories and our history.' Qasim from 6S added: 'At home, you focus on family stories but now in school we hear the big stories.' We look forward to learning more about the history.

Oracy

The All-Party Parliamentary Group on Oracy, a group of politicians investigating the importance and impact of oracy in schools, has just published its much anticipated final report. As part of the process of it being written, Elmhurst gave both written and oral evidence to the committee and, as a result, was chosen as one of the seven schools highlighted in the document as having good oracy teaching. We were particularly commended for our work to support children who do not have English as their first language. Mr Creighton should be commended on his work to raise the profile of the school in this area.

Mental Health Support in Elmhurst

We now have a mental health team in school which is managed by Jane Nash (AHT) and includes the following staff who provide support for children and families:

- Ibtissem Amiour school counsellor who works with children on Mondays and Tuesdays
- Elinor Lobley trainee mental health practitioner who runs meetings and individual sessions for parents around positive behaviour management. She will also be starting work with a year 6 class on a project called 'Brain Buddies' which helps children to regulate their emotional wellbeing.

Helena Kaliniecka - Child psychologist from the child and adolescent mental health service, who provides termly support and advice for children and families in school.

Upton Park Road Safety Campaign

As you may already know, we have been petitioning for change on Upton Park Rd to make it safer. It is a very dangerous road with drivers often speeding and driving carelessly. As part of our campaign, the School Council recently wrote a letter to The Newham Recorder to tell them about the dangers of the road. The letter was quickly picked up by the reporter and he came to interview the children the very next day. The children spoke incredibly well and passionately shared their concerns for themselves, their families and the local community.

The article was great and you can find it on their website or if you google 'Newham Recorder Elmhurst'. As part of the article, the news reporter phoned the Council to ask why no action has been taken, despite Ms Samra and Mr Ahmed asking the Council to help in the past. This push led to a meeting happening with the Highways Department of Newham Council later that week. I spoke with them and they have agreed to looking into getting a zebra crossing and a crossing patrol to guard it during the busy hours of

the day. They will also complete a survey of the road to assess the issues and have another meeting to discuss a way forward. This is great progress in our mission to make Upton Park Rd safer for the school and the local community.

Well done to the School Council for their great work on this issue. Watch this space to see what happens next!




SEN Work this Term





Our children with SEND in KS1 have been making great progress in and out of the classroom. They have attended groups such as:

'Attention Autism' (or 'bucket group') to develop attention and listening skills Music therapy with our music therapist - Laurence Carey to develop communication and interaction. Sessions in the sensory room to develop sensory awareness. Activities in the soft play room to help with emotional regulation. SEN movement sessions with Mr Ben our PE teacher. They have their own work stations in the classroom and are included in whole class lessons as well as quieter sessions with their TAs.







Exciting Curriculum Changes!

As we near the end of this academic year and look forward to the next, we know that you as parents have many questions about the school's curriculum and changes that might be happening to address the effects of the pandemic. Therefore, our final newsletter next term will be a bumper curriculum edition.

We are very proud of having designed a curriculum to inspire our pupils and also of the adaptations and changes that have been made to support them over the two academic years where their learning has been disrupted. We feel confident that we are systematically addressing gaps in learning that will give your children the best start to the next academic year.

In the next newsletter, we will have detailed sections on the changes in place for the Maths and English curriculum as well as sharing with you some of the ongoing work we have been doing in sequencing our foundation subject curriculum, including the planning of brand new units. We will feature some of those new units, such as Year 6's Partition of India unit that have been newly planned and delivered and we will include pupils' opinions on these.

Pupils will be sitting end of year assessments in the forthcoming weeks, so this will be an opportunity to reflect and compare pupils' progress with our last set of formal assessments two years ago. I have been working with staff and parents from the PTA to start work on the very large mosaic which will be erected in the KS1 playground. The mosaic was designed by artist Ursula Kelly who came into school last year. Lockdown has interfered with her plans and I've been asked to help out. The artwork for the mosaic was made up from the pupils own drawings and now those pupils are also helping to assemble the tens of thousands of individual glass tesserae that will make up the mosaic. We have dozens of great colours that are glued to glass fibre sheets which will then be fixed to the wall before being grouted, making a beautiful and long lasting legacy artwork for the school. We're just getting started, with many days work ahead of us, but its been great fun!

The staff and parents have been very helpful and supportive, and I'm enjoying working at Elmhurst immensely. Mosaic is slow work, but as everyone gets more practice, we'll get it done as soon as we can!


Still Water - Meerub 6V





Flotsam - Neev 4A




I also recommend Planet Omar because it teaches you that no matter what happens there's always a solution to it.

I would rate this book: 9/10




Grandad's Secret Giant - Matteo 3T
